Prez Says

Six things I love about photography

- 1. The camaraderie of other photographers. Pursuit of excellence in photography can be a somewhat solitary exercise, which is why I so value the experience and company of others who share the same enthusiasm for their craft. Whether it be out on a field trip, critiquing each other's images, learning new techniques or enjoying others' work at exhibitions, the sharing of ideas, skills and experiences is something I treasure.
- 2. The pleasure of printing your own images. Someone once said that you haven't completed your photograph until you have printed it and I couldn't agree more. There is something magical about seeing your image emerge gradually from the printer and enjoying the tactile pleasure of handling your own printed image. From there, there is the pleasure of mounting it and finally hanging it on the wall. All my own work!
- 3. Getting out in the magic early light. Being entranced by the beauty of the natural world and the quiet of the wilderness. Capturing an image somehow becomes secondary to the joy of the experience.
- 4. Learning and perfecting a new skill. We are blessed with a panoply of learning resources today via books, video and the internet but I find I learn best working face to face with a mentor. I need time and practice to explore a new skill or technique but there is great satisfaction when you have finally nailed it!
- 5. Studying and absorbing the work of the great photographers of the past. I have always been a history buff and the history of photography has fascinated me. I was first drawn into the work of the pioneers of New Zealand photography as a window into a life of another time. Beyond our shores, the work of masters like Eugene Atget, Henri Cartier-Bresson, Lewis Hine, Dorothea Lange, Weegee, Robert Capa, Alexander Rodchenko and Ernst Haas has been inspirational.
- 6. Making Photo Books. I enjoy writing and publishing equally as much as photography so converting my images into book form has been a logical move. Many are made simply for my own enjoyment, recording family events and holidays but others seek a wider audience. I have produced books of the photos and memories of the elderly of Fairlie, a small town in South Canterbury, the fortunes of local sports teams and weddings and milestone birthdays of friends.

Lee is a recent member of Wellington Photographic Society, returning to her hometown after spells in Nelson, Wanaka, Christchurch and Greymouth. She is a learning designer, developing online content for educational programmes and is currently working at the Open Polytechnic.

Who is your favourite photographer?

I love the work of Vivian Maier, the American Street photographer, who fitted her photography into her spare time of forty years working as a Nanny in Chicago. Her vast store of images was not discovered until after her death in 2009.

I am attracted to the candid nature of her photographs and the way she captured the era in which she lived.

More recently I saw "All things photographical" and was seriously taken by, and gained a sound insight into Garry Winogrand's street photography.

Photographic genres you pursue?

I enjoy most genres of photography, particularly the simplistic Japanese style of photography. My long term ideal would be to be able to combine my twin passions of travel and photography. I also love fashion photography and had a lot of fun with that when I ran Revolve, a second hand clothes shop in Plimmerton.

What's your creative process like?

I'm always looking for something different. I enjoy experimenting with black and white photography, reflections and working with and controlling light. Capturing those critical moments can be so inspiring! Since joining WPS I have been reminded of using Lightroom more in post production and been enjoying getting back into this - although I prefer minimal screen time due to my job and try to work around this.

Favourite Piece of Gear?

I took an Olympus OM1 film camera when I first travelled overseas in 1995 and that served me pretty well. Today I shoot with a Canon digital camera and have just replaced the kit lens with a good quality 50mm prime lens that I am very happy with. I am hoping my brother will part with his camera gear later this year!

Photographic disasters/lost opportunities?

I was hiking alone in a remote part of the Scottish Highlands when I came across a large black wild cat, very much like a panther, that I have since heard were kept as pets in Wales and freed. I zoomed in with my OM1 yet were so struck by this large cat that I missed the National Geographic moment of shooting it.


I recently travelled with my French friend in Southern Spain. I got up at 5am to capture some unique shots of the cueva/ cave housing in the early morning light but sadly I later lost the card containing all of these beautiful images! All the more reason to shoot more!

How have you taken your photography to the next level?

I completed an digital photography course at the Tanz eCampus and teamed up with four other photographers while I was in Nelson. We formed our own Facebook Group and were out photographing stuff every weekend.

Earlier this month, I interviewed John Boyd, who has been a life member of Wellington Photographic Society since 1995. Newer club members may recall that John was the judge of our 2018 Projected Image Competition but he has been involved with WPS for nearly 25 years.


John's interest in photography started while he was still as school in Alexandra and his later banking career saw him involved with nine Camera Clubs and Photographic Societies over the years. He is the Patron of the Photographic Society of New Zealand (PSNZ) and is an Honorary Fellow and Member of that body. He also holds an Associateship of the Society APSNZ.

John describes himself as a pictorialist with

a special affinity for landscape. I interviewed John at his Wadestown home overlooking the harbour.

How did you get involved in photography in the first place?

As a schoolboy in Alexandra, I used photography to record my tramping trips. I then joined the Alexandra Camera Club where I came under the influence of people like Ernie King, Jack Shepherd (the local professional who had a camera shop in the back of his garage) and Jim Chalmers who all encouraged me. I then had to choose between fishing and photography as both require you to be out near dawn or towards dusk. Photography won out then but these days I do get out fishing while staying at our place in Turangi.





Early influences in your photography?

I greatly admired the work of Matheson Beaumont from Dunedin and his very sensitive portrayal of landscape. He and I also became very firm friends. The late Ernie Ashby from the Dunedin Camera Club was the man who first started me in judging. The late Fred Bowron was another photographer who captured landscapes in a very sensitive manner.

What inspires you about photography?

For me it is the joy of capturing special moments.

Your favourite spot in New Zealand to photograph?

Central Otago without a doubt. The golds and browns of those landscapes are really something special. In comparison, the greens of the North Island landscapes are much more recessive and don't have the same impact.

Do you have a prized piece of photographic equipment that you own?

Not really. My first camera after the Box Brownie was an Agfa Silette and my first SLR was a Pentax S1A with a 135-225 Tamron lens. Today I shoot with Lumix cameras but still have my Nikon film cameras, one with half a roll of unexposed film from 2003!

Do you have a photographic tip to pass on?

My advice for any photographer setting out would be to enter into as many competitions as you can. In that way you will get valuable feedback from judges as to the quality of your work and how it might be improved.

Techniques of composition can be reasonably easily learnt. But in my experience, constructive feedback from experienced photographers is invaluable.



Canon AE-1

A QUICK REVIEW OF INTERESTING CAMERAS OF YESTERYEAR.

The Canon AE-1 was one of the first film cameras of its time to use a central processing unit (CPU), through the lens flash (TTL flash), and automatic exposure settings. The rest of the camera is all good old manual. This makes life a little easier for someone who is switching from a completely automated digital camera to a manual film camera.

CPU's were fairly new at the time that this camera was first released. The CPU means it can be combined with an FD lens (the Canon lens mount of the era) to take advantage of shutter priority & aperture priority modes.

These days, every time I shoot with the Canon AE-1 Program is memorable. I usually keep my 28mm on the camera as that's the way I

often shoot when shooting casually. Together they make a light combination and one that doesn't stand out the way a full DSLR does. It is perfect for taking places my bigger cameras would normally get left behind.

The simplicity, and usefulness, of an aperture priority camera is often looked down on, I for one welcome it - sometimes it is ok for photography to be easy and fun, not a task to be mastered! It can be nice to focus on the image for a while and ignore the technicalities.

In short, if you are looking for a camera to not just introduce you to film photography, but to make you fall in love with it, Canon AE-1 is the camera for you. Today in 2018, despite being a vintage camera it has many features that would help any photographer take great images with relative ease.

There is something really peaceful about using this camera, as there is with most film cameras, in that it forces to slow down and think about your exposure choices. It also has the capability to shoot quickly when needed. Try doing that with any rangefinder ;)

You can't help but be patient and spend time with this camera and develop qualities that are useful in building your photography, meaning it can provide a valuable learning experience to amateurs and beginners, and even helps experienced photographers grow.





Learn to cut your own mats



- **Images:** Can be any resolution, but file size must be below 3mb
- **No Watermarks:** (Images will have name/title attached)
- Other images Specs: High Resolution, Srgb, 300ppi
- **Image titles:** Please name files with your first name and last name and image title.
- **Image description:** Descriptions/titles should be concise and be nothing more then a title or a few words which describe the image.
- **Submission Date:** No later than the 27th at 5pm
